Mandarin Fish, also known as the Dragonet fish, are sometimes referred to as the most beautiful fish in the sea. They are found mostly in the warm waters around Australia and the Ryukyu Islands of Japan. They belong to the Perciformes family (the Perchlike fishes). Mandarin fish love to snack on easy to kill prey, like baby snails and different types of crustaceans. But, the Mandarin fish have to watch out while searching for food because their main predator, the Scorpion Fish, also loves to eat baby snails and crustaceans.

Mandarin Fish have a triangular shaped head and large protruding amber eyes, paired with alluring bright colours and blue and green stripes painted across its back along with elegant yellow patches wrapping it all together. It has an undercoat of brown and yellow with all types of different fins like two dorsal fins, caudal fins, 2 pectoral fins, another 2 pelvic fins and finally 1 large tail fin.

A weird thing about the Mandarin fish is that normally all fish have scales that stop them from getting that hurt from their predators, but the Mandarin fish don't have any scales because instead they have sharp spikes covered in a thick mucus that covers their whole body from head to toe. Apparently this slime smells terrible but that is so you will know not to touch this fish because if you do the fish will inject a highly toxic poison into your bloodstream and it will probably kill you.

These fish occur from the Philippine Islands to the Great Barrier Reef, Australia. Dragonet fish live and eat mostly on the sea bed swimming through coral and protected areas around where they live at depths of about 3-60 feet (1-18m) below sea level. Mandarin fish always have a small group of fish around them spread out across the small area where that family of Mandarin fish live. Found mostly around the beautiful Ryukyu Islands, Japan.

Yummy crustaceans like copepods and amphipods are a hungry Mandarin fish's favourite food, as well as little innocent baby snails and protozoans found crawling along the sea bed around the coral. These fish are a huge fan of easy to kill prey because it's hard work being so beautiful.

The dangerous Scorpion Fish sneaks around looking for tasty snacks that will fill them up, and small Mandarin Fish are the perfect choice because while the dragonet fish are carefully looking around the reef for their next yum dinner, the Scorpion Fish also love the exact same food as they do. So while the fish is looking around for food their predator will use them to find the food for them and then will sting Mandarin Fish in the head or the chest and slowly swallow them.

Now you will understand why the Mandarin Fish is definitely the most beautiful fish in the sea and hopefully this will make you want to have a trip to the Great Barrier Reef or to the Ryukyu Islands in the great country of Japan and have a quick peek at the marvellous Dragonet fish and the only word that will be coming out of your mouth will be

"WOW".


